

Trends and challenges require us to think differently about growth

- Thrive Montgomery 2050 = more **urban**, more **diverse**, and more **interconnected**.
- Growing while achieving three major outcomes—economic health, equity, and environmental resilience—requires refining our planning framework, not abandoning it.
- Principles of smart urbanism—a compact form, a mix and diversity of uses, walkability, active and healthy lifestyles, and a focus on good design—are the future.












A Plan to Thrive

A web of centers and corridors focusing growth around transit stations and along the major corridors.




Major Themes

Nine themes form the basis of all recommendations in the Plan



- Complete Communities through compact form of development and urbanism
- 2. Corridors are the place for new growth
- 3. Start planning for people instead of planning for cars
- 4. Eradicate greenhouse gas emissions

- 5. Attainable housing for all income levels
- 6. Evolution of single-family neighborhoods near transit
- 7. Racial justice and equity
- 8. Great design and the importance of place
- 9. Regional solutions and strategies

Thrive Montgomery 2050, as a General Plan, does <u>not</u> include cost estimates


A General Plan's high-level policy guidance informs master & facility plans that identify specific projects for implementation

Timeline for General Plan Implementation






Covid-19 and Requests to Delay the Plan Why we need to complete the plan

- Issues in the Plan such as housing affordability and equity existed prior to the pandemic and need to be addressed now, not years from now.
- It will take longer than six months or a year to know the long-term impacts of Covid-19 if societal changes are dramatic, the plan can be revised.
- Any significant delay will squander time and money spent on the outreach and the work that has been done over the past 2 years. A delay will require starting over on outreach and data collection.
- The Public Hearing Draft is the beginning of a public process, not an end.

 Community feedback will continue through the County Council review in 2021.
